Highlight the dreams that were shared – are these achievable? What would it take? Take especially abou the dreams that could be supported by community fire prevention initiatives

You can modify the lessons to work for your community.</li> <li>AFM has lessons on Stop Drop and Roll, Calling the Fire Brigade, Fires in our Homes, Preventing fires from Candles and Lamps, Cooking and Electrical and preventing and responding to Bush Fires. These are all developed with a rural and urban context.
